Leafs look to pull surprise attack on state AA meet

This year's Geneseo's boys track team has been surprising Coach Don Fredericks just about every time he turns around.

The fifth-year Maple Leaf coach hopes that can continue one more weekend for his youthful surprise-a-minute club. This weekend would be an ideal time for it as the Leafs take four individuals and two relays into the Class AA State Track Finals at Eastern Illinois

University's O'Brien Field track.

In all, the Leafs will send 10 athletes to the meet. That group is comprised of seniors Jason Van-Vooren and Michael Bell (3200 relay), Chad Blunt (400 relay) and Ben Mayes (100 and 400 relay); juniors Adam Boardman (1600), Bryan Glass (3200), Mike VanDeVelde (400 and 400 relay), Justin Van-Vooren (3200 relay) and Ryan Verbeck (400 relay); and freshman Josh Pierce (3200 relay).

"We're excited about having that many kids go

down," said Fredericks.

But Fredericks getting excited over this team is nothing new. Each meet, his youngsters have con-

tinued to improve and impress.

"I hope they have a couple of surprises left," said Fredericks. "This has been a great year, a year that won't soon be forgotten. They have been pleasant surprises all season long and a few more would be a fitting way to end this year.

"This is not a team that does not perform when the big meet comes. This team does not back down

to adversity. This is a great opportunity."

The Leafs' best chances appear to run with Boardman in the 1600 where he is seeded with the 13th-best time. The Leafs' coach also pointed to the 400 relay as a unit to watch.

An oddity about this contingent is that none of them have ever run at the state track meet. But Fredericks still insists that nerves shouldn't be a

"We've got some experience here," said Fredericks. "Our football players are used to playing in front of a lot of people and our distance runners have run in the state cross country finals for two years in front of 10,000 people in Peoria. Our kids are big game and big meet performers. That expe-

rience should lend itself well for what they're going to face in Charleston." And while this could be their biggest meet, Fredericks is approach-

ing it a little differently. "It is just another meet," said Fredericks. "It's not a life or death situation and you can't build it into something it's not. It is important and as a coach, my goal is to see the kids perform at their top level

But even that wouldn't be much of a surprise.

9 Leafs advance

State finals set for May 25, 26

A season of hard work paid off for nine Geneseo athletes who advanced to the state meet from the Rock Island Sectional track meet held Friday, May 18

Those who will be competing Friday and Saturday, May 25 and 26 in Charleston are individual qualifiers Bryan Glass, Adam Boardman, Mike VanDeVelde and Ben Mayes and relay qualifiers Ryan Verbeck, Chad Blunt, Jason VanVooren, Justin VanVooren and Josh Pierce. VanDeVelde, Mayes and Boardman will also run relays. It marks the most athletes Geneseo will send to the state meet in since Coach Don Fredericks has led the Leaf program.

Rock Island won its own sectional with 56-1/2 points followed by Moline (45), Galesburg (40-1/2), Geneseo and UT (26 each), Sterling (25), Dixon (13-1/2), Ottawa (12-1/2), Canton (11), Quincy and Macomb (10 each) and LaSalle-Peru and Rock Falls (three each).

"We just had an exceptional meet. Nearly everything went very well for us," noted Coach Fredericks.

Glass and Boardman, both juniors, were the two winners for the Leafs.

Glass and Moline's Cesar Lopez dueled down the stretch in the 3200 meter run and both were clocked at 9:40.6, but Glass was declared the winner.

"Bryan just ran a gutty race. Everybody, not just the Geneseo and Moline fans, were on their feet for this one. It was one of the most exciting races I've ever witnessed," said Coach Fredericks.

Boardman bettered his previous best time by two seconds with a 4:23.7 time in the 1600 meter run, the third best time in school history. Only Rich Werkheiser and Phil Walsh have faster times.

Mayes finished in a three-way tie with George Guy and Johnson for second place in the 100 meter dash to earn a trip to Charleston. All three were clocked at 11.0 seconds, behind only the 10.9 time of Cletis Dortch of Galesburg.

VanDeVelde was the other individual qualifier for the Leafs. His 50.0 time in the 400 meter dash broke his own school record but earned him just fourth place in the race. Only two athletes qualify from each event unless a set time is met. VanDeVelde's time is the qualifying standard.

Two relay teams also advanced. The 400 meter relay team of Verbeck, Blunt, VanDeVelde and Mayes was clocked at blistering 42.8 seconds to set a new Geneseo school record. Galesburg won the event with the same time.

The 3200 meter relay team of Justin

Van Vooren, Jason Van Vooren, Pierce and Boardman was clocked at 8:06.4 behind only Moline's time of 7:59.6.

Boardman ripped through the anchor leg of the race in 1:56 for the Leafs.

Scoring points for the Leafs were Jon McAvoy, who was fifth in the discus, Blunt and Shane McKibbon, who were fourth and fifth, respectively, in the 110 meter high hurdles, Mayes n the 200 and the 1600 meter relay team.

All of the Leaf qualifiers, except for Glass, will begin competition at state with preliminaries on Friday, May 25 at 9 a.m. There are no preliminaries in Glass's race, the 3200, which will be run Saturday, May 26 at 12:50 p.m.

CHARLESTON — While the defending Class AA state champion Rock Island Rocks found the going extremely tough here Friday in the opening day of the Boys Class AA State Track Meet, Moline, Geneseo and United Township found some reasons to smile.

Moline's Tauwon Taylor advanced in two open events and joined the 1600-meter relay unit of Alberto Furman, Shawn Clay and Mike Shannon into the finals here Friday at Eastern Illinois University's O'Brien Field track.

Geneseo set a school record by getting six athletes into the finals the 400 relay of juniors Ryan Verbeck and Mike VanDeVelde and seniors Chad Blunt and Ben Mayes; Adam Boardman in the 1600 and Bryan Glass, who qualified right into the finals.

United Township's Chris Roberson is hoping a sore back holds up today. In Friday's preliminary action of the high jump, he cruised through, making 6-2, 6-4, and 6-6 in his first attempt at each.

Rock Island's Jarrin Williams was the lone Rocky qualifier. He takes the sixth-best preliminary time into today's 300 intermediate hurdle event.

Roberson jumping clean

Roberson alone carries the Panther banner into today's finals and

has a very legitimate chance of coming away with a high place. Figuring, of course, his back cooperates.

"He's had a pinched nerve low in his back," said jump coach Gary Phillips. "All we can do is hope."

The Panthers attempted to help the cause as he scratched from the triple jump to save himself.

Roberson was right at home on the harder surface at the indoor facility. Roberson and the rest of the high jumpers were saved from the weather that the runners had to brave.

"I just like it better in here," said Roberson of the indoor jumping facility. "The mats are lower than they are outside and I'm used to

In the 800, his specialty, Taylor fought off the windy home-stretch and battled to a 2:00.35 clocking, eighth-best.

And, according to junior Mike Shannon, Taylor "carried us again" into the finals.

"I felt good all day," said Taylor. While the weather made it tough to tell in the 800, he did make the fi-

nals.

"I really didn't run the race I wanted," said Taylor. "But the main thing was to make it into the finals."

Taylor's coach, Jeff Quick, likes

his pupil's chances today.

"I think he can do well in all of them," said Quick, who also has Cesar Lopez qualified directly into the 3200-meter finals.

Leafs on record run

Geneseo coach Don Fredericks was a tough man to contain Friday afternoon.

After getting qualifiers from his 400 relay and Adam Boardman in the 1600, Fredericks was a very happy man.

"This is the most kids Geneseo has ever had in the finals," he said of the six who will take to the track

today. "All of our kids performed admirably."

The 400 relay unit barely made it into the finals, tying for the ninth and final spot in today's finals field. Boardman also just squeaked into the finals despite finishing second in his heat.

In the first heat, Boardman ran in blustery conditions that died down for the the second and most of the third heats.

"I didn't want to lead," said Boardman who led through the middle part of the race. "But I didn't want to play games and have the other heats go faster. I tried to push the pace a little."

He battled the top-seeded runner, Schaumburg's Rick Miller, all the way and finished with a 4:25.94, second in the heat.

"The 400 relay ran a tremendous race in just horrendous conditions," said Fredericks. "I hate to single out anybody, but Chad Blunt really lit the track up."

Fredericks is always optimistic and he has no reason not to be that way about his runners in the finals.

"I think they can all do very, very well," he said, flashing a wry smile.

Tough day for Rocks

Things just didn't go well for the Rocks all day.

None of the three qualified relays advanced to the finals, and Williams was the only individual.

"This is sad," said Williams of his own running. "I did better last year as a junior."

Time-wise, maybe, but last year he failed to make the finals, which he at least did this year.

"I think I can be in the top six," said Williams, projecting a finish.

Five Leafs named all-state

Boardman nabs fourth in 400

Distance runner Adam Boardman and the 400 meter relay team of Ryan Verbeck, Mike VanDeVelde, Chad Blunt and Ben Mayes came home with medals to highlight Geneseo's participation in the Class AA state track meet held Friday and Saturday, May 25 and 26 in Charleston.

"What a tremendous way to end the season. The guys had to battle bad weather and the best competition they've seen all season and they all just did a great job," said a jubilant Coach Don Fredericks.

Gusty winds and rain greeted all of the athletes the first day of competition but that did not slow down Boardman, who finished second in his heat of the 1600 with a time of 4:26.

The following day, with the weather improved somewhat, the Leaf junior blazed to a fourth place finish in the event in a school record time of 4:19.3. That time eclipsed the 4:21.3 record time of Rich Werkheiser set in 1982.

Equally impressive for Geneseo was the effort of the 400 meter relay team. In the preliminary round they tied with Alton for the last qualifying spot in the finals with a time a 43.45 seconds.

In the finals, the Leaf foursome raced to an eighth place finish with a time of 43.16 seconds, their second best time of the season.

The five athletes mentioned above, by placing in the top eight in the state meet, earned all-state honors. They are the first Geneseo boys track team members to earn such notice since Tim Renihan was an all-state selection in 1983.

"The truly exciting part is that three of them are juniors," noted Coach Fredericks. Boardman, VanDeVelde

and Verbeck will be back for another run at a medal next season for the Leafs.

The Leafs also competed in four other events in the state meet but did not make the top eight.

Junior distance ace Bryan Glass competed in the 3200 meter run and finished a very respectable 13th with a personal best time of 9:40.2. There were no preliminaries in this event.

Mayes ran two of his fastest times of the season in the 100 meter dash. His 11.02 clocking in the preliminaries qualified him for the semifinals, where he ran an 11.04 to narrowly miss a chance to run in the finals.

"I thought I had a shot at the top five," he said. "I would have been happy with a top eight finish."


But the impossible turned to reality for the Leafs on Saturday.
