Experienced Leaf contingent heads

local state track AA hopes

The possibilites are enchanting for the Quad-City Class AA boys heading into Friday afternoon's preliminaries of the IHSA State Track Meet in Charleston.

For instance, if sectional seeds translated directly to state finals results, Geneseo would be bringing back a state champ. Senior Adam Boardman, who finished fourth in the mile last year, is this year's top seed. Add to that a fifth-place seed, which is where senior Michael VanDeVelde goes into the 400.

"We're excited about the possibilities for Geneseo this weekend," said Maple Leaf coach Don Fredericks, who is cautiously optimistic.

"In retropsect with the weather conditions of last weekend, the sectional performances may be a little misleading," he said. "I think a person has to examine the overall rankings from the season and not just look at sectional times. From the same standpoint, though, that's where everybody was on that given day.

"I'd rather have us listed where we are near the top than at the bottom."

Another strong case for the Maple Leafs is the load of experience they are taking into the state meet. In addition to Boardman and VanDeVelde, who qualified in the 400 and was an all-stater on the 8th-place 400 relay unit last year, Bryan Glass, who qualified in the 3200, finished 12th in that event last year.

"A lot of times kids are down at the state meet for the first time and overwhelmed by the whole thing," said Fredericks, who has also had most of his kids run in the state cross country meet. "That shouldn't happen to us. "The best way to focus in on it is to try and focus in and take care of your business, do what you're capable of doing and be satisfied when it's all over."

Fredericks thinks his club also has a good shot of getting the mile relay (Ben Hahn, Boardman, David Farmer and VanDeVelde) into the finals along with 300 intermediate hurdler Shane McKibbon.

While Geneseo's are the best seeds any of the 26 Q-C athletes, expectations are running high for good efforts from all of them.

"What we're going to do is go down there and try to PR out," said Rock Island coach Ed Lillis, who is taking 10 kids in seven events to Eastern Illinois University, which serves as host sight for the meet. "If we do better than what we've done so far in all seven events, we'll be on the bubble.

"It's not like we have to make astronomical drops in order to make the finals; we're within range. Just like every team down there, things have to go well and go smoothly, the

kids have to be on and be focused.

"If those things fall together, then we'll have more than one event represented Saturday. If those things don't happen then what we're looking for is those PRs. All we've ever asked of the kids is to do their best and that's all we're asking this time."

Except for Victor Jones, who is still nursing a sore knee, the Rocks will enter the meet healthy. One change the Rocks have had to make is the addition of DaShawn Guy to the group of Aaron Taylor, Terence Parks and Jones in the 400 relay. He replaces freshman Tito Veasey who, after missing the Saturday conclu-

sion of the Sterling Sectional, is no longer on the team.

That same group is also running in the 800 relay and will be joined by senior Zach Stengel in both hurdle events; Ryan Taylor in the discus; the 3200 relay unit of Doug Hansen, DaShawn Pernell, Eric Belby and Nick Presson; and Aaron Taylor is also in the 200.

Chris Roberson and Dameon Dunbar hold the highest hopes of making it into Saturday's finals of the four United Township qualifiers

Roberson, who came home with a bronze medal from last year's high jump, is in a monster pack with a dozen other jumpers who cleared 6-5 in the sectional and is tied for seventh-place in the seeds. Junior shot putter Dameon Dunbar is seeded ninth.

UT coach Jim Wesselmann is optimistic Roberson can put things together and at least make it into Saturday's finals.

"We know that 6-6 or 6-7 is usually the magic number to get into the finals," said Wesselmann, who likes where Roberson is heading into the meet. "If he's feeling good and everything comes together, I think he can go 6-7 at least."

Last year Roberson cleared 6-6 to make the finals where he recorded a 6-7 best.

"If Dameon can match his 54-foot (sectional) toss, most years that's enough to make it into the finals," said Wesselmann of the first-time qualifier. "In fact 54-feet is usually good enough to place sixth, seventh, or eighth."

Those two are joined by teammates Maceo Strickland in the 200 and Josh Crisp in the long jump. Both are sophomores in their first trips to state.

Moline's hopes, based on sectional outings, are slim at best. Mike Shannon (800) amd Brent Earl (triple jump), both turned in season-best efforts at sectionals and are still seeded back in the pack in their respective events. The 3200 relay unit of Shannon, Kevin Hubbard, Rick Babcock and Steve Cunningham was right at its season best of 8:10.55 and was seeded 12th, Moline's best.

Shannon is the lone Maroon repeat qualifier.

Record setter

VanDeVelde nabs seventh in 400

Mike VanDeVelde of the Geneseo varsity boys track team placed seventh in the 400 meter dash and broke his own school record twice in the process at the Class AA state finals held Friday and Saturday, May 24-25 in Charleston.

East St. Louis Sr. won the team title with 52 points. Rounding out the top five were Evanston (43), East St. Louis Lincoln (37), Proviso West (32) and Decatur MacArthur (26).

VanDeVelde won his heat of the 400 preliminaries with a time of 49.17 seconds and then came back with a 49.14 second effort in the finals to place seventh. Both times bettered his own school record of 49.8 seconds.

"Mike just had an outstanding meet. His times, especially for how windy it was down there, were just fantastic," said Coach Don Fredericks.

Bryan Glass and Andy Snook finished ninth and 12th, respectively, in the 3200 meter run for the next highest finishes for the Leafs. Both competed in the "slow" heat comprised of runners who finished in the bottom half of sectional times.

Glass was clocked at 9:35.8, missing eighth place and the accompanying all-state honor by .9 of a second.

Snook turned in a 9:42.8 effort to post the 12th best overall time. They finished two-three in their heat.

The Leafs were represented in four other events and, while none qualified for the finals, each made a good showing.

Shane McKibbon ran a personal best

time of 15.02 seconds in the 110-meter high hurldes and placed fifth in his heat. The top four advanced. He also ran a respectable 42.06 in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles.

The 1600 meter relay team of Ben Hahn, Adam Boardman, David Farmer and VanDeVelde turned in a school record time of 3:24.66 and won the heat but missed advancing to the finals by one place.

Boardman, who had the top seed in the 1600 entering the meet, went out fast in his race and narrowly missed advancing to the finals. His time of 4:23.9 was fourth in his heat and one second behind the third qualifier.

"Adam ran a 60 second quarter and a 2:05 half and just didn't have enough left at the end. The strategy probably wasn't the best but you can't fault the effort. He went down there with the thought of winning a state title, not just making the finals and winning a medal. He gave it his best shot," said Coach Fredericks.

"I thought all of the kids gave an excellent account of themselves. We had kids run their personal bests with the pressure of a state meet to deal with. It is hard to ask more than that," he added.

All of the Leaf track team members were honored at their annual awards banquet held Thursday, May 30 at J.D. Darnall high school.

Boardman was named most valuable, VanDeVelde received the most improved and Kevin Fuhr nabbed the most inspirational award.

Captains were Boardman, McKibbon and Brad Diericx.

The school records set this season by VanDeVelde in the 400 and the 1600 relay team of Hahn, Boardman, Farmer and VanDeVelde were also mentioned.

Recognized for their contributions to the track program were Jim and Lynn Van Vooren, Bruce and Marilyn Boardman and Vic Boblett.

Q-C AA contingent

is near-bust

CHARLESTON — Heading into the Class AA 1991 IHSA Boys State Track Meet, most of the Quad-City athletes were on the bubble.

Friday at O'Brien Field on the Eastern Illinois University campus,

that bubble burst.

Of the 19 events in which the Q-C was represented Friday, only one —Geneseo's Michael VanDeVelde — qualified.

Just how bad was it?

Geneseo's Adam Boardman, who finished fourth in the mile last year, was undefeated outdoors this season and was seeded No. 1 out of sectionals. He got caught in a quick start, burned himself out and missed qualifying by one spot and less than two seconds.

"I went out way too hard," he said, showing the pained expression of a hard lesson learned. "I bit the bullet real bad in the last half."

UT's Chris Roberson, a bronze medalist last year in the high jump, topped out Friday at 6-4 — well below his capability — and failed to advance, which took 6-6 to do so.

Rock Island's Zach Stengel surprised a few people in the 110 high hurdles. He advanced out of the preliminaries and into the semis, where the top three finishers from each heat make the finals. He was manually clocked as the third finisher, but a picture taken by the accutrack timer placed him fourth, .03 of a second out and the finals.

It was that kind of day.

The lone Q-C survivor turned out to be Geneseo's VanDeVelde in the 400. The senior blazed to a school-record 49.17, won his heat and advanced as the sixth-fastest qualifier.

"That wind was terrible," said VanDeVelde of the strong headwind hitting runners on the straightaway. "I just went out and did what I had

day's finals by teammates Bryan Glass, a senior, and sophomore Andy Snook, both who will run the 3200. They escaped Friday's misfortunes by not having to run preliminaries.

For the rest of the local Class AA contingent, they weren't so fortu-

nate. It wasn't that the times were bad, it was that they just weren't

For example, Geneseo's 1600 relay of Ben Hahn, Boardman, David Farmer and <u>VanDeVelde clocked</u> a school record 3:23.74, as Boardman shrugged off the mile disappointment and <u>VanDeVelde scorched</u> to a 48.49 anchor. VanDeVelde earns All-State honors atmeet

The end of the race draws near for Geneseo's Mike VanDeVelde in the finals of the 400 meter dash. The senior quarter miler captured the seventh place medal with a new school record, earning him All-State honors.

CHARLESTON - Everytime Mike VanDeVelde has competed in the 400 meter dash lately, he has set a new school mark in the event and Saturday was no different as the senior sprinter turned in a time of :49.14 to take seventh place in the IHSA Class AA State Track and Field Meet at Eastern Illinois University.

VanDeVelde, the Quad-Cities only Class AA medalists, was also a member of the Geneseo record-setting 1600 relay team which helped him earn All-State honors, a first for any track member at Geneseo High School.

The Leafs performed extremely well Friday's preliminaries as a team, with


eight of their ten events turning in personal bests.

VanDeVelde broke the 400 meter school record with a time of :49.17 to win his heat and advance into Saturday's finals with the sixth-best time despite a strong headwind effecting all runners on the straightaway.

The 1600 meter relay team failed to advance but ran a record-breaking time of 3:23.74 behind the efforts of Ben Hahn, Adam Boardman, David Farmer and VanDeVelde. Shane McKibbon ran a personal best in the 110 high hurdles but his :15.02 mark was not enough to advance him. The senior hurdler ran a :42.0 in the 300 low hurdle race.


Senior Adam Boardman, who finished fourth in the mile last and seeded No. 1 out of sectionals, took off in his 1600 race in a fury and by the end of the fourth and final lap had burned out. He missed qualifying for finals by one spot and less than two seconds.

Bryan Glass and Andy Snook competed in the 3200, which runs only a final race on Saturday. Glass turned in a 9:35.77 to finish second in the slower first heat and place ninth overall. His time of just .8 of a second out of eighth place and a medal. Snook, a sophomore, also ran in the first of the two heats and finished 14th with a 9:42.79.





VanDeVelde nabs seventh in 400

Mike VanDeVelde of the Geneseo varsity boys track team placed seventh in the 400 meter dash and broke his own school record twice in the process at the Class AA state finals held Friday and Saturday, May 24-25 in Charleston.

East St. Louis Sr. won the team title with 52 points. Rounding out the top five were Evanston (43), East St. Louis Lincoln (37), Proviso West (32) and Decatur MacArthur (26).

VanDeVelde won his heat of the 400 preliminaries with a time of 49.17 seconds and then came back with a 49.14 second effort in the finals to place seventh. Both times bettered his own school record of 49.8 seconds.

"Mike just had an outstanding meet. His times, especially for how windy it was down there, were just fantastic," said Coach Don Fredericks.

Bryan Glass and Andy Snook finished ninth and 12th, respectively, in the 3200 meter run for the next highest finishes for the Leafs. Both competed in the "slow" heat comprised of runners who finished in the bottom half of sectional times.

Glass was clocked at 9:35.8, missing eighth place and the accompanying all-state honor by .9 of a second.

Snook turned in a 9:42.8 effort to post the 12th best overall time. They finished two-three in their heat.

The Leafs were represented in four other events and, while none qualified for the finals, each made a good showing.

Shane McKibbon ran a personal best

time of 15.02 seconds in the 110-meter high hurldes and placed fifth in his heat. The top four advanced. He also ran a respectable 42.06 in the 300 meter intermediate hurdles.

The 1600 meter relay team of Ben Hahn, Adam Boardman, David Farmer and VanDeVelde turned in a school record time of 3:24.66 and won the heat but missed advancing to the finals by one place.

Boardman, who had the top seed in the 1600 entering the meet, went out fast in his race and narrowly missed advancing to the finals. His time of 4:23.9 was fourth in his heat and one second behind the third qualifier.

"Adam ran a 60 second quarter and a 2:05 half and just didn't have enough left at the end. The strategy probably wasn't the best but you can't fault the effort. He went down there with the thought of winning a state title, not just making the finals and winning a medal. He gave it his best shot," said Coach Fredericks.

"I thought all of the kids gave an excellent account of themselves. We had kids run their personal bests with the pressure of a state meet to deal with. It is hard to ask more than that," he added.

All of the Leaf track team members were honored at their annual awards banquet held Thursday, May 30 at J.D. Damall high school.

Boardman was named most valuable, VanDeVelde received the most improved and Kevin Fuhr nabbed the most inspirational award.

Captains were Boardman, McKibbon and Brad Diericx.

The school records set this season by VanDeVelde in the 400 and the 1600 relay team of Hahn, Boardman, Farmer and VanDeVelde were also mentioned.
