### Frosh's tie wraps p title hat-tric

Complete domination in varsity cross country by the Geneseo harriers has happened again this year. For the first time in Geneseo's history, a complete sweep of the N.C.I.C. conference meet occurred Saturday, October 18 in Galesburg.

Geneseo's Lady Leafs put together an "incredible team effort," according to their coach, to capture its third N.C.I.C. title in as many years. The varsity Leafs also gave a "great team effort" earning its second N.C.I.C. title in a row.

To complete the sweep, Geneseo's frosh-soph squad brought home a victory, tying for the top slot of the meet with Princeton.

After losing six of the top seven harriers last year, Don Fredericks, coach of the cross country teams, feels the Leafs are overachievers. "They have really grown up a lot during the season," Coach Fredericks stated.

LaSalle-Peru was a main competitor for the young Leafs in the N.C.I.C. meet. LP entered the meet unbeaten in duals. The two squads had met three times, LP taking two of the three meetings. One defeat was at the Sterling Invitational when the Leafs were without several key runners. out 1-3. The receives on level

Coach Fredericks expected junior Phil Walsh to finish among the top three in the strong field and that is just where Walsh finished. Brian Wilson of Sterling took the top seat over the 3.15 mile course with Rob Dowell of Dixon in second.

Overall, Geneseo took the meet with 47 points, 13 points ahead of

second place finisher Sterling which marked 60 points.

"Walsh ran a beautiful race. He is a money runner who always comes through," Coach Fredricks commented. "Walsh and Haars earned All-Conference," Coach Fredericks added, having finished within the top 10. Mike Haars, who finished ninth in the field, was a key to the Leaf victory, having run his best race of the season.

Three members of the varsity squad earned honorable mention All-Conference. Jason Van Vooren, a freshman, finished in 12th place while Scott Johnson, senior tri-captain, ran a "smart race" for a 13th place finish. Packed with his teammates was Brad Baker, 14th in the field. Mr. Fredericks said Baker, a sophomore, ran "a conservative but intelligent race. He's a very dedicated young man."

Coach Fredericks' pride continued to show for his team as he spoke of seniors Bill Holevoet and John DeGrande. The coach stated Holevoet "went crazy out there. He took almost one minute off his best time...that just isn't done. Senior pride does run deep.'

As for tri-captain DeGrande, Coach Fredericks praised him for sacrificing himself in the first mile as a "psychological weapon, giving his teammates confidence in attacking the field."

Mr. Fredericks' pride didn't stop at the varsity boys' level. It ran deeper into the varsity girls' division and onto the frosh-soph squad.

Seven Lady Leafs finished within the top 17 slots of the N.C.I.C. meet. And the competition was rough this year. But that didn't stop the Lady Leaf harriers. "They knew what was expected of them and got the job done, in most cases, surpassing my expectations," Coach Fredericks gleamed.

Geneseo's 34 point finish was four points less than last year's squad but it was enough to take the top spot. Second place

Kewanee tallied 63 points.

A question prior to the N.C.I.C. competition was whether Kewanee's Amy Reecy could finish ahead of Geneseo's runners over the 2.1-mile course. The question was answered when Reecy took the tape in 12:42 for first. Lady Leafs took the next three slots.

Lorri DeBlieck, Gail Perkins and Connie Gradert have been top finishers for Geneseo all year. DeBlieck took the second place finish. while Perkins and Gradert followed in third and fourth, respectively.

The second place finish gave DeBlieck her fourth All-( fernce award in cross country. She is a senior this year and on the team's tri-captains. Perkins and Gradert also ear All-Conference awards.

Perkins, just a sophomore on the squad, literally "exploded" last three weeks, according to the coach, taking many seconds her best times every week. Gradert is a junior member. Fredericks commented on her "steady race. She is one of the key our success for the rest of the season."

The varsity girls also had three members earning honors mention All-Conference. The three finished in the 12th, 13th 14th slots just like the varsity boy runners. Sophomore F Chapman, the 12th place finisher, ran a "smart race with excellent finish." Junior Tara Zeitler captured the 13th slot b gutsy effort for an "excellent finish" while Kirsten Kemmis, onl freshman this year, took 14th with her gallant effort. The Bridge

Freshman Renee Clifton also finished for the Lady Leafs. In first major race as a varsity cross country runner, Clifton finished 17th place. "She really popped one. She ran a very relaxed rac Coach Fredericks stated. He added, "Renee and Bill (Holevoet) w the true surprises of my day."

Four frosh-soph runners took slots in the top 10 finishers Geneseo. "If Vic had been healthy..." Coach Fredericks indicate higher finish may have been made by the frosh-soph team witl healthy Vic Dzekunskas. He has been a number one runner for squad all season long, when healthy.

Freshman Brian Walsh picked up the slack for Geneseo; came first for the squad but fourth for the field. Three of his teamma

also finished within the top 10.



DIXON — To no one's great surprise, Geneseo's powerful girls' cross country team won its third straight NCIC meet championship Saturday.

But, to the utter dismay of a slightly favored LaSalle-Peru team, Geneseo's varsity boys defended their league crown, too, cracking the Cavaliers and the rest of the field with an all-out opening mile of the 3.15-mile

"We're a packing team," said an elated Geneseo coach Don Fredericks, who credited senior John DeGrande with "Driving the big green bus," over the first mile — Geneseo's term for "pacer," or "rabbit". After a mile, DeGrander fell back, winding up 27th overall, but the damage had been done. Geneseo's pack of runners was well ahead of L-P — which ended up in fourth place.

"We were running relaxed, and L-P looked tight," said Fredericks. "After a mile and a half,

I yelled out, 'you're conference champs!' and they responded with smiles, and they ran even more relaxed after that."

Geneseo junior Phil Walsh placed third, and teammate Mike Haars took ninth, earning both all-league honors, which go to the top ten place finishers.

Sterling's Brian Wilson was the individual winner, clocking 16:00. Geneseo scored 47 points, beating a total of 60 posted by Sterling, and 80 by third-place Dixon.

a big 34-63 margin over secondplace Kewanee, with the Boilers standout Amy Reecy, beat a strong trio of Geneseo runners into the finish chute, clocking 12: 42 over the flat 2.1-mile course at Sauk Valley College.

"Reecy just stole the race with a great opening half-mile," praised Fredericks. Geneseo's Lorri DeBlieck, Gail Perkins and Connie Gradert placed second, third, and fourth, respectively, DeBlieck coming in just eight seconds behind Reecy.
