


Maple Leaf runners to cover state course

GENESEO — It will be an upbeat and optimistic coach Don Fredericks who will march into Peoria with both his boys and girls cross country teams

this Saturday.

For the first time ever, Geneseo High has qualified both squads for the state meet during the same year.

There will be 27 boys teams and 27 girls teams in the Class AA state events, to be run on the fast, flat Detweiller Park course, which is tucked between the Illinois River and the Peoria bluffs along Illinois 29 on the city's far northeast side.

The girls race starts at 11:30 a.m., and the boys go off at 12:45. If you plan to make a day of it, be advised the Class A boys run at 9:30 a.m., and the Class A girls take off at 10:30.

There's no admission fee, but be prepared to be part of a moving crowd of 6,000 to 10,000 persons.

Awards for the Class AA meet will be given out at 3:30 p.m. in the gym at Peoria Central High School, 1615 North North St.

A total of 238 boys and 238 girls qualified to run in the Class AA state races during last week's sectional meets. They're the survivors of a 3,000-runner Class AA field which began the state series two weeks ago. The top 25 finishers in each of Saturday's races will earn all-state recognition, and there's team trophies for the first three teams in each race.

Geneseo's girls finished seventh at state last year, "and we're better now...if we're healthy," Fredericks said.

The only thing is, some of the other teams are better, too. Fredericks believes girls cross country in Illinois is improving rapidly.

Nevertheless, Fredericks thinks a top 10 team finish is possible for the girls - and for the boys. For Geneseo's guys, especially, such a happening — in probably the most competitive boys cross country state meet in the nation — would be a dream come true.

"And, they've worked so hard for it," Fredericks said.

Fredericks said he thinks the health situation on his girls squad will be better this Saturday than it was last, when the wheezing, sneezing Leafs barely made it through the sectional meet.

"Two years ago, Downers Grove North had a similar thing happen. Two runners were sick the day of sec-

dropped out. But one ran, and they managed to qualify. The next week, they won the state meet. I'm not saying we'll do that, but you never know," Fredericks said.

"I don't know what to expect," said Geneseo's coach. "But we're hopeful we'll put things together."

Fredericks said sophomore Wendy Wassell has a chance to run her way onto the all-state team. He thinks Karmen Rochrs and Brandi Hilton can make runs at the top 25, too. The rest of Geneseo's team Saturday: Gail Perkins, Renee Clifton, Kirstin Kemmis, and Kim Chapman.

"Downers Grove North and Arlington Heights Hersey are the two best teams in the state," Fredericks said. "Naperville Central, Downers Grove South and Hoffman Estates Conant all are coming on. And, we've run with those teams."

Individually, no one has beaten or even challenged. Erin Boland of McHenry, last year's state runnerup. But she hasn't run against Anije Siems from Hinsdale Central, who also hasn't tasted defeat.

The girls run a 2.1-mile course.

The boys run a three-mile layout. The course won't be new to Geneseo's boys — they've competed on it twice this season — but experience in the state meet will be new, for all seven Leafs. "But that doesn't bother me," Fredericks said. "That's because Jason VanVooren and Brad Baker control our younger kids, make them run in a pack. I think it'll take a time of 15:10 to make all-state, and we've got guys I who I think can do that. I think our front four (Jason VanVooren, Baker, Bryan Glass and Adam Boardman) all could be in the top 50."

And if they are, said Fredericks, the unranked Leafs can make a real run at the top 10 in terms of team finish.

The rest of Geneseo's squad: Justin VanVooren, Brian Walsh and Cubby Drwig. This trio usually produces the all-important fifth Leaf finisher in

the team favorite in the boys race.

"They're extremely talented. But last year, St. Charles should have walked away with the meet. They wound up in ninth place. Moline's in the thick of this thing, and there's nothing we'd like better than to see Moline win it, and break up the suburban stranglehold on the state title."

Fredericks said Elmhurst York and Stagg, along with Schaumburg and Moline, "are the only teams who have a shot."

There will be three boys and three

great, because it'll give all of us some individuals to key on," Fredericks said.

Individually, Fredericks said Dan Nolan of Naperville Central "is tough. But I think both Mario Vesey from Rock Island and Joe Perez from Moline have great chances, too."

Geneseo's boys team will return six of its top seven runners next season. The Leaf girls will return five. "This will be a great experience for us," Fredericks said. "No one's expecting much from us, so there's no pressure. We think it'll be fun."

Geneseo girls have a winning habit

Winning has become old hat for the Geneseo girls cross country team.

They've won five straight NCIC championships, five straight regional titles and three of the last four sectional titles. Saturday, they try to make it four sectional titles in the last five years.

"We can't rest on our laurels and we know that," said Geneseo coach Don Fredericks. "We may have won the title a number of times, but each year it's a different team that wins it."

This year, though, there are very few changes. Six of the seven girls scheduled to run Saturday's 10:30 a.m. race at Sterling's Woodlawn Elementary School are returning from last year's sectional championship team.

Seniors Gail Perkins and Kim Chapman will be in their fourth straight sectional. Juniors Karmen Roehrs (who led the Leafs in last week's regional championship), Rence Clifton and Kirstin Kemmis, sophomore Wendy Wassell and freshman Brandi Hilton round out the squad.

"I think it's a confidence factor," said Fredericks of the streaks. "The

teams of the past no longer exist and it's this team's time to do what it can."

Perkins could have the worst time of all Saturday as she has been battling a flu bug all week. If she can't run, either sophomore Kelli Miller or freshman Suzanne Patton will fill in.

"We want to win sectionals again," said Fredericks. "The biggest thing, though, is to qualify for state. We can be off a little bit and still qualify, but we can't be complacent. We have to go out and run hard."

So far that season, running hard has not been a problem. That's one of the reasons Geneseo is again ranked No. 9 in the final Prep Power Ratings, released this week.

They may need all the help they can get. The girls' field is shaping up to be very competitive. Along with the Leafs, Fredericks sees United Township, Rockford Guilford (the school that beat them at sectionals in '86), Belvidere and Peoria Richwoods as other to contend for the top five qualifying spots.

One-two punch sparks

Rocky hopes in state meet

Rock Island's boys cross country team may have qualified for the state meet this weekend at Detweiller Park in Peoria, but it should be the school's top individuals that make the most noise for the Rocks.

Senior sensation Mario Vesey, a returning all-state performer, and Steve Tanner, who has been one of the best in the area this fall, will lead the Rocks in the 3.1-mile title

race Saturday at 12:45 p.m.

It will be a lone individual — junior Kris Braet — that carries the Rocky banner in the 2.1-mile Class AA girls' race at 11:30 a.m.

The objectives for each will be quite different. Vesey, undefeated in his senior season and the second-highest returner from last year's state meet, has his sights set on the state individual title. Tanner will be looking to improve on his '87 35th-place finish, while Braet, in her second trip to the state finals, will hope to improve on her 74th-place finish.

As for the dark-horse Rocky team, who knows?

Behind Vesey and Tanner, both making their third appearances at state, the Rocks will have a very young, inexperienced team. Juniors

Marlon Hall, Ian Frink and Greg Wilkening, sophomore Mike Gustafson and senior Matt Helms round out the state-bound squad.

"If we finish anything better than 27th, I'll be happy," said coach John Coolidge of his team's finish in the 27-team field. "Nobody is expecting much of the Rock Island team except the Rock Island team."

Big expectations, however, lie with Vesey and Tanner.

"There's no question about it, he's as capable of winning the state title as any kid in the state," said Coolidge. "Mario has a lot of factors in his favor and I think he has his head screwed down tight."

While Coolidge is hoping for a very good finish out of Tanner, he

won't put a number on the senior's possible placement.

"Steve is the eighth-best returner from last year's race," said Coolidge. "We want him to go down there and run a good race and get all-state with a top 25 finish."

Rocky girls coach Bob Wilson is hoping to see improvement out of Braet in her second trip to the finals.

"We're hoping that she will, of course, improve on last year's finish," said Wilson. "I don't know if she's ready to get an all-state finish, but we think she might be able to finish in the top 50."

It's shaping up to be a good day for the Rocky individuals. Maybe the Rocks can help make it a good day for their team as well.

"I'm so happy right now," Fredericks said. "But what a feeling it was to wait like that (after the girls race) and not know."

Geneseo's chances at state? That depends on health and the opposition of course, "but I think both our teams have chances to make the top 10," Fredericks said.

Geneseo's girls have been ranked among the state's top 10 all season.

But Geneseo's boys haven't been, and such a finish would be especially sweet for them.

The boys, certainly, have waited a long time for this chance to prove themselves in the state meet.

"We're going for the top 12," senior Brad Baker said, one of Geneseo's front four runners. "If those of us in the front four can run well, and we get a decent fifth-place finish, we can do it."

Both the course and the field dictated a fast start at Saturday's sectional on the flat Hoover Park course, which is much like the state course the Leafs will run on Saturday.

"Glass (Bryan) went by me about a mile-and-a-half or two miles into the race," Baker said, adding with a laugh, "I don't know what got into him."

Glass was the first Leaf into the finish chute, finishing 11th overall. He's a sophomore — and this is a very young Geneseo cross country team. There are four sophomores, two juniors and a senior.

"After a mile, I started moving up," Glass said, who also noted the fast early pace. "It's kind of hard not to go out fast," Glass said. "This course is fast," Glass said, "and there were so many good runners here," Justin VanVooren said.

"We packed it up good," the Leafs' Adam Boardman said. "We showed we can compete as a team, and I thought it was kind of fun."

"Glass ran an incredible race, and

Justin VanVooren had a great performance," Fredericks said.

The girls looked like they were headed for a great performance, too.

"They went for it today, from the start," Fredericks said. "And, they had it won at the half-mile mark. But then the illnesses did them in."

Well, not quite. The girls battled, none harder than Renee Clifton, who was second on the team to Wendy Wassell on this day.

"I just saw that Gail (Perkins) wasn't up there and that Brandi (Hilton) had dropped back," Clifton said. "We needed someone up there."

"Renee pushes the entire race," Fredericks said, noting that she also has a good finishing kick.

Wendy Wassell was Geneseo's leading runner Saturday, placing seventh overall after leading for a time.

"I felt good at the mile mark," Wassell said. She had been ill the week before at the regional meet.

"Wendy needs to develop a better kick," said Fredericks about the sophomore ace. "It's a matter of form, getting the knees up, the arms pumping, and getting up on her toes."

Fredericks said with all due respect to the other Leaf runners, "it was Clifton to save our team win in the regional, and it was Clifton who saved our trip to state today. She finished ahead of where I had projected."

"I didn't worry about it," Clifton said. "I just got going."

Geneseo girls cross-country team

hoping to shake off flu

It was a history-making day Saturday for the Geneseo cross country teams at the Sterling Sectional meet and the Maple Leafs are hoping for even more headlines at Saturday's state meet.

Last week, for the first time in the school's history, both the boys and girls teams qualified for state. Saturday, the girls run their 2.1-mile race at 11:30 at Detweiller Park, while the boys' 3-miler goes at 12:45.

"I'm just ecstatic," said Coach Don Fredericks.

The Geneseo girls were expected to qualify and were even favored to win the sectional team title. The boys, on the other hand, were in a position to challenge only if they ran well.

What happened was that the girls, battling flu as well as the competition, struggled to qualify in the fifth spot, while the boys were a very competitive third in the team standings.

"I'm just thankful and praise the Lord that the girls are going to have another weekend," said Fredericks. "There were a few panic-stricken moments waiting for these results to come out when I didn't know if we'd made it or not."

But they did manage to make it through, and Fredericks is hoping the extra week can help the girls overcome the illnesses that severely weakened their efforts last week.

"We're getting better, so I'm very optimistic," said Fredericks earlier

this week of the medical reports. "We still have several days to get them healthy."

Just how well the girls can do is a big question. Last year's squad finished seventh and Fredericks has maintained all year that this year's team is even better.

Wendy Wassell, a healthy Gail Perkins and Karmen Roehrs will lead the charge and be supported by Brandi Hilton, Renee Clifton, Kirstin Kemmis and Kim Chapman.

"If the girls go in healthy and are feeling reasonably good Saturday morning, I think a Top 10 finish is a possibility," said Fredericks. "The Top 5 would be great. Top 3 would be incredible."

While the girls are trying to rebound for a good showing in their fifth straight trip to state, the boys

will still be riding an emotional high from their first qualification.

"Our boys are a young team and they are really coming on," said Fredericks. "We've gotten incredible leadership from senior Brad Baker and juniors Jason VanVooren and Brian Walsh and that's really been a big help. Our boys won't be intimidated."

While the older guys will provide the leadership, the youngster should lead on the course. Sophomore Bryan Glass has been their front-runner, followed by VanVooren, Baker and sophomores Adam Boardman, Justin VanVooren and Cubby Orwig.

"They're really looking forward to it," said Fredericks. "This is the first state meet — cross country or track — for any of them."

Boys 12th, girls have tough day at state cross country meet in Peoria

PEORIA — Geneseo's boys cross country team hadn't been rated as one of the top 15 squads in the state all season.

That's why, after it was learned the Maple Leaf boys had secured 12th place in Saturday's Class AA state

meet, coach Don Fredericks said, "Oh man, we'll take it."

While the guys came home from state with something to build on, the girls came back knowing their assignment is to rebuild.

The girls, rated in the state's top 10 all season, couldn't overcome a rash of late-season illnesses, and placed 20th in a 25-school state field. "We're

disappointed, after top-10 finishes the last three years," Fredericks said.

The state meet was run in bitter weather at Detweiller Park. A steady drizzle fell throughout the late morning and early afternoon. Temperatures were in the high 30s, and northwest winds at more than 20 m.p.h. created wind chills in the teens.

Rock Island's Mario Vesey was the

individual winner in the boys race, winning by a whopping 13 seconds over the 3.0-mile course. And, Moline's boys team, coached by Geneseo resident Jeff Quick, placed third, earning the Maroons a team trophy.

Geneseo junior Jason VanVooren was the first Leaf into the finish chute, taking 61st in the 228-runner field. He was followed by Adam Boardman (84), Brad Baker (92), Bryan Glass (101), Justin VanVooren (183), Brian Walsh (210) and Cubby Orwig (222).

Geneseo ran its usual race - holding back a bit at first, forming a pack, then passing runners the last two-thirds of the race. And, in this race, they didn't let the superior talent which was in front of them bother them.

"The boys packed it all the way," Fredericks said. "They really ran their race, and they started picking off (passing) guys after the first mile.

"It's not easy to run pace in this race," Fredericks said. "The pace here is always fast, and guys can get discouraged when they fall behind early. But 12th place as a team is outstanding when you consider we ran with four sophomores."

"I put everything I had into it, and maybe too much into the first part of the race," Jason VanVooren said. "I really wanted to make all-state (top 25)" he said.

"In terms of the team, I think we're satisfied with what we did, although we all would have liked to have gone higher. But, we gave it our best shot, and that's all you can ask."

"I wanted all-state; it just didn't happen," Baker said. "But team-wise, well, I was happy there."

"I was really comfortable out there today," said Baker, the only senior on

the boys' team. "I'm ready for track tomorrow."

"I don't think I paced the race all that well," Boardman said. "I went out like a I wanted, but I lost it after the second mile."

Glass, the fourth member of Geneseo's "four pack," never quite was able to get up with the other three, but he kept them in sight. "And I felt OK," he said. "I saw them just ahead so I tried to catch up. Our key is going together the whole race."

Miracle didn't happen

"We were praying for a miracle," Fredericks said about the girls, who barely survived the sectional meet the week before after being slugged with the flu and a wave of colds.

"At this level, you've got to feel good," Fredericks said.

From a team standpoint, the race was a nightmare for Geneseo's girls, as team after team they had beaten at major meets during the season surged past them in the state finals.

Fredericks as late as last week thought a finish as high as third place was possible from this team - but only if the girls were completely healthy and in top form.

They were not.

Sophomore Wendy Wassell was Geneseo's top finisher, placing 50th in the 210-runner field. She was followed by Renee Clifton (108), Karmen Roehrs (125), Gail Perkins (157), Kirstin Kemmis (159), Brandi Hilton (181) and Kim Chapman (185).

"This team peaked about a month ago, at the Sterling Invitational," Fredericks said. "The endurance base was just not there, and it showed at the end of the season."

"Our girls have got to get more serious about off-season training," Fredericks said. "Our area of the state is exploding, and our girls got nailed with that this year."

Wassell was 50th after finishing 53rd in this race a year ago.

"I wanted to be in the 30s," she said. "It was a fast pace, and I tried to get out and go," she said.

"We were told all week we could

pull it together, but it wasn't easy," said Perkins. "It think it would have taken another month. It was very hard to come back. I was hoping for the miracle. But I was tired."

Perkins is one of two seniors on the girls team; Kim Chapman is the other. "It just didn't seem like the state meet today, for some reason," Chapman said.

Clifton, a junior, may have come closest to her potential in the state meet. She was Geneseo's second finisher. "A good race for me? Yes, it felt like it," she said. "They went out fast, and I went with them. You have to work harder on your form in the wind, though."

"We needed," Wassell said, "to stay healthy."











Vesey wins state; Moline harriers 3rd

PEORIA — All season long, when asked to assess their teams and top runners, both Moline coach Jeff Quick and Rock Island coach John Coolidge kept saying that it only matters how they do at one meet — state.

Well, get out your crayons and circle Nov. 5, 1988 on your list of important dates in Quad-Cities sports history.

The reason is simple. The numbers don't lie. One state champ, one third-place team and 5 — count 'em, 5 — All-State runners.

Mario Vesey capped his unde-

feated season with another victory and with it won the first individual title for the area since Moline's Ray Ott turned the trick in 1957.

Moline, behind the All-State finishes of seniors Joe Perez, Rob Harvey and Eric Edmunds, brought back the highest team finish and first-ever IHSA cross country team trophy for the Quad-Cities — taking third, behind No. 1 Schaumburg and Elmhurst York.

Rock Island senior Steve Tanner showed his resiliency as he came back from being sidelined early in the campaign to close his career with a 21st-place finish and the final All-State Q-C spot.

Vesey and Tanner also helped the Rocks to a lofty 15th-place finish.

Even the Geneseo boys, a surprise team entry considering their youth (4 sophomores and 2 juniors) even got into the act. The Maple Leafs finished 12th in the 27-team field.

The bottom line? It was remarkable, a red-letter day in the truest sense of the phrase, especially considering the cold, windy and wet conditions for the 3-mile cruise through Detweiller Park.

Vesey, pushed all day by Naperville Central's Dan Nolan after the Moline senior trio fell back, finished with a 14:42 clocking — slow for the flat, fast course, but good enough on a less than conducive running day. Moline's three seniors were up with Vesey at the front early in the race before.

"I felt good the whole race," said the champ. "I ran it just exactly the way I wanted to."

The same couldn't be said for the Maroons. Perez and Edmunds were a little disappointed in their individual place finishes, but said that the team finish made up for it.

"The team finish makes us real happy," said Edmunds.

"It's a good feeling," said Perez. "It means that all four years weren't for nothing."

"I felt I had to do it this year," said Harvey, who came through in a big way in his senior year. "I felt dead in the middle of the race, but said to myself that I can't get out of here with nothing. I'm really pleased that I did better than 101st like last year. It's a lot better feeling."

Those three got plenty of help from underclassmen Dave Krauel, who finished 69th and Cesar Lopez, who was 76th.

"The seniors came a long way from being 18th three years ago and choking and finishing seventh last year to have it culminate in this," said Coach Quick. "It's very gratifying."


The Rock Island contingent was also happy.

"This is a crowning example of what hard work and effort can lead to," said Coolidge. "Both Steve and Mario paid their dues for this. They both deserve it."

"It feels great," said Tanner of the All-State finish. "I was just exhausted in the last couple hundred yards and couldn't even see anything. I heard Coach Coolidge say I was 26th and I said to myself 'I'm not coming close again.'"

Last year he finished 27th and two spots away from a medal.

Maroons earn state-wide respect with third-place finish

Moline High School's soccer and boy's cross country teams brought home their state tournament hardware Sunday, showing it off to an enthusiastic crowd of about 400 proud parents, students, and boosters at Wharton Field House before formally presenting it to school principal Ken Schwab.

Both teams took third place honors over the weekend. Cross country coach Jeff Quick also introduced his girl's team, which placed 12th, higher than any other local team.

"Twenty two years ago I walked across this same floor as a graduate of Moline High School, and if you'd told me that I'd be standing here now in front of a lot of parents, a lot of students, I'd have said you were crazy."

"This has been an outstanding year for me and for the young people behind me."

"Part of this for me is kind of a let-down because I know now I won't have (seniors) Joe (Perez), Rob (Harvey), and Eric (Edmunds) anymore," Quick said. "No one knows what those three mean to me and to Moline cross country. You don't replace them. You just find new kids and get a new start."

However, Quick looks forward to three more years of coaching freshman Trista Lester, who paced her team by finishing eighth in the girl's race, the highest-ever placing by a Quad-City girl.

And they all survived a lot of turmoil, including dashed expectations. Quick thought the team was a contender for state hardware last year, but came up short with a seventh-place finish.

That seemed to be the driving force for this year's effort. They knew they had the ability to have the best finish ever by a Quad-City team in the state meet and they worked hard toward that goal all summer. The miles in the sweltering summer heat weren't easy, but in the cold, damp conditions Saturday at Detweiller Park, they paid their dividends.

"We finished strong," said Edmunds. "It's better finishing that way than we did in the past. Coming

And that shows just how far these kids have come. Not only as runners, but also as young men. While pleased with their accomplishments, they knew that there were still individual goals that went unattained. Saturday was a day that will no doubt live in the school's record books for some time.

Moline girls take 12th

PEORIA — Sometimes a team can be fortunate to catch a break. The Moline Maroon girls' cross country team caught a big break two weeks ago and rode it out to the best finish of the local Class AA girls teams here Saturday in the state meet at Detweiller Park.

The big break the Maroons got was a foul-up by the IHSA that allowed five teams to qualify out of the girls regional when only four should have. I knew I had to go out quick and stay with the pack to do well."

Lester's quick start even had her in the lead early in the race and she stayed among the leaders to the end.

"We sat down and figured that her regional time would equate out to about 15th, 16th, or 17th in the state meet," said Quick. "We knew she had a shot at All-State, but we never envisioned Top 10."

Lester didn't see that lofty a finish, either. "I was just going for a Top 25 finish," she admitted.

Senior Jane Johnson finished 88th for the Maroons, sophomore Trisha Rounds was 111th, Laura Clark was 118th and Joellyn Gentry was 132nd.

The biggest disappointment of the day belonged to the Geneseo Maple Leafs. Looking at a possible Top 10 finish, the Leafs weren't even in the hunt for a Top 15 spot.

"Maybe we were looking for a miracle today," said Geneseo coach Don Fredericks. "These girls are better than 20th. I still say that this is a Top 10 team, but sometimes things just don't work out."

Wendy Wassell was the top Lady Leaf finisher, coming in 50th.

After watching his young runners finish 17th, UT coach Bob Feller was pleased.

"With all these young kids, we did all right," said Feller. "It was a great experience for all these kids."

Cheering each other, that's the way it is

PEORIA — I attended the awards ceremony for the state high school cross country meet Saturday, and found it intriguing.

Four races - for Class A boys and girls, and the same for Class AA, were run in the morning and early afternoon in Detweiller Park, which is along the Illinois river in far northeast Peoria - out beyond Peoria Heights, actually.

The awards aren't handed out until later in the afternoon - and then at a site at least five miles from the course. That site: Peoria Central High School, about eight stoplights, a pizza joint and a hamburger stand away, in the heart of the city.

And yet, the gym was filled - twice - by about 2,500 cross country fans each time, who trekked across town to honor first the Class A and then the big-school runners.

Until this day, there probably are more squirrels than people who view cross country meets in Illinois. But what a change on state finals' day!

For openers, there are anywhere from 6,000 to 10,000 fans in Detweiller Park, and with sound carrying across water the way it does, they no doubt can be heard half way to Washington when the runners hit the final quarter mile to the finish chute.

The recognition in the gym which follows is special, too. There is a camaraderie in cross country you don't find in many team sports. Everybody's fans do a good bit of cheering for everybody else's kids.

It's so special, that some of the winning teams take the time to shower and dress - in suits, even tuxedos.

Rock Island's Mario Vesey, a runaway winner of the Class AA boys' race, is a popular guy, and when he was introduced, the crowd rose as one to cheer.

The top three teams in each class receive a trophy, and get to parade across the Central High gym while the crowd roars.

Sitting up in the balcony at Saturday's ceremonies were coach Don Fredericks and his Geneseo boys and girls squads. Fredericks thinks his teams can be among those picking up one of those top three trophies, and soon.

Top 3 material?

"The talent to be a state contender might be there for our girls next season. It is for the boys," Fredericks said.

That's just about the opposite of what Fredericks has been saying the last couple years, when the girls were the state contenders. But, the boys got their coach's praise the old fashioned way. They *urnnhned* it, as the late John Houseman used to say.

And, they'll have to keep earning it, as the girls found out.

The boys team Geneseo fielded on Saturday included just one senior, Brad Baker, two juniors, Jason VanVooren and Brian Walsh and four sophomores, Bryan Glass, Adam Boardman, Justin VanVooren and Cubby Orwig.

A key for them was off-season work, which they did. They'll have to do it again - and more - this year. If they do, thinks Fredericks, regional and sectional championships are not beyond their reach.

Fredericks has been careful all season not to discredit his girls. What he

has tried to get across to people is that what the boys have achieved - finishing with 12th place in the state meet - came against tougher competition than the girls have gone against.

He hasn't said it just that way, for fear he'd offend his girls and those who follow them.

But let's look at some facts. The boys' state meet in Illinois is 42 years old. The girls are in just their 10th year of competition. Only now is the Quad-City area starting to get really competitive in girls cross country. At the state level, there have been far more outstanding boys teams at the finals than there have been great girls teams - but those numbers are starting to even up.

There's no question Fredericks and his girls were disappointed with a 20th-place finish, although both know it would have been a lot better with better health.

And, Fredericks isn't angry with his girls, or even bitterly disappointed, when he said they need more off-season work. He's just concerned - concerned that the people he works with and cares about might not be doing everything they need to do in order to be the best they can be.

"This is a challenge to our girls," Fredericks said. "Things have gone pretty much their way for three years. But they've got to get more serious about their off-season training."

Fredericks said extensive off-season work builds a runner's endurance, and sometimes that endurance can help a runner through a short illness. "The endurance base was not there for our girls this year," Fredericks said. "And it showed at the end of the season."

"You have to make a commitment, because good things don't just happen," Fredericks said.

The good things are dressing to the nines and marching across the floor of Central High's Lions Den while thousands cheer. How badly do the Leaf runners - male and female - want these things? In time, they will answer.

Dog eat dog

Hoffman Estates Conant won the girls Class AA state title, making it seven times in the last 10 years a team from the Mid-Suburban League has won.

"The reason we can attain what we have is the competition day-in, day-out," coach Allan Goodman said.

Schaumburg, favored to win in Class AA boys, did so, but not before its best runner, Scott Lilley, gave a lot of folks a rush. Lilley had three separate incidents late in the season where he hyperventilated because of a blood sugar problem, and until just before race time, a rumor was sweeping Detweiller Park that he wouldn't run.

He did, and other than from eight guys who finished ahead of him, he had no trouble at all. Had he not run, the door would have been wide open for second-place Elmhurst York and third-place Moline.

Moline's finish, by the way, was the best-ever by a Quad-City team.

Chrisman won both the Class A boys and girls titles, and coach Roger Beals, who coaches both squads, said the thrill was greater than the pair of third-place finishes he has directed his Chrisman boys basketball teams to.
