Moline's cross country teams dominated last week's Rock Island Regional. The big question, heading into Saturday's Sterling Sectional, is can they do it again?

Moline coach Jeff Quick thinks both his boys and girls teams can come home with championships.

The girls will have the first shot in their 2.1-mile race at 10:30 a.m. The boys will get their crack at more hardware in their 11 a.m. 3-mile race. Both races will be contested at Woodlawn Elementary School in Sterling.

Moline's boys are defending champs, while the girls finished third, ahead of United Township and Geneseo for the five '88 team qualifying spots. Geneseo's boys finished second and Rock Island was fourth.

It's looking like the Quad-Cities could again play a big part in this sectional dance. The Moline boys enter wearing the favorites tag and the Maroon girls are one of a top trio. The Rock Island and Geneseo boys and the United Township and Geneseo girls all have legitimate shots at top five team finishes and trips to the state meet Nov. 4 at Peoria's Detweiller Park.

Boys to beat? Moline

"Our boys are the favorites," said Moline coach Jeff

Quick. "We were ranked third last week in the state and Peoria Richwoods is the only other ranked team. I don't think we've run a total team effort — three will run well and three don't. We're ready to put it all together."

What has Quick so optimistic is the return of sophomore Kevin Hubbard and senior Brian Spriet to go with his top three of Cesar Lopez, Tauwon Taylor, and Dave Krauel, and Carlos Rivera and Travis Waters.

That could be the key for Moline to hold off the likes of Rock Island, Geneseo, Peoria Richwoods, Peoria Notre Dame, and Rockford Guilford.

Rock Island, with senior Mike Gustafson back in the lineup after battling the flu, could also make it.

"If I know what I see, by the looks of practices, I would say, yes, we could," said Rocky coach John Coolidge of a team trip. "I think the kids are primed, pumped and ready to go out and do it."

Rocky could be in great shape with Marlon Hall contending near the top, the addition of Gustafson and the recent emergence of freshman Greg Whitcomb.

Geneseo is also sitting in good shape with its top three of Adam Boardman, Bryan Glass, and Jason Van-Vooren.

United Township's boys also qualified in the team

event, but coach Gary Phillips, because of the youthfulness of his club, is realistically just using this event to get his youngsters some experience for next year.

Heated battle expected in girls sectional race

STERLING — It figures to be a heated battle when state-ranked girls powerhouses Moline, Belevidere and Peoria Richwoods get together on the trails of Sterling's Hoover Park for Saturday's Class AA Cross Country Sectional.

Champions of last weekend's Rock Island Regional, Moline brings the best rating, according to Illinois Prep Top Times, to Saturday's competition as it held the No. 10 spot

in the final regular-season poll.

But breathing right down its necks, with little room for comfort, was Belvidere's Lady Bucs along with defending sectional champ Peoria Richwoods which was right on their tail, as those two teams owned the 11th and 14th poll positions respectively.

With those schools looming as strong possibilities to grab three of the five team-qualifying spots for next weekend's state meet in Peoria, it means those No. 4 and No. 5 posi-

tions will be hot commodities for the remaining 13 teams in the field.

Getting back to Moline, which is led by sophomore Trista Lester, who'd probably have to be tabbed Saturday's individual favorite, the Lady Maroons had little difficulty claiming the RI Regional crown with 32 points to 62 for Western Big Six counterpart East Moline.

Perennial state-qualifier Geneseo finished third with 67.

An eighth-place finisher in last year's state meet, Lester clocked a course-record of 11:41.5, 10 seconds better than Chris Lammers of United Township and 25 seconds ahead of Rock Island's Kris Braet. Braet had set the course mark while beating Lester in the Western Big Six meet the previous week — over the 2.1-mile Saukie Golf Course — and saw her effort bolstered by her teammates who allowed only a gap of 23 seconds between their second (12:28) and fifth (12:51) runners.

For Belvidere, its win at Boylan has to be considered just as impressive, if not more than Moline's in that it scored fewer points (29) despite having three of its top seven run-

ners sidelined.

Most notable in her absence was two-time sectional champion, junior Leslie Pottinger, who won sectional and Sterling Invitational titles here in both 1987 and 1988. She was held out of action one week after winning the NIC-9 championship with a possible stress fracture in her foot.

Her status because of the injury, which has bothered her much of the latter half of

the season, was uncertain at midweek.

With her older sister sidelined, freshman Tami Pottinger stepped into her shoes and finished a strong second to Tammy Dahlin of Rockford Guilford. Dahlin had a winning

time of 14:05 over the 2.25-mile course, five seconds faster than the younger Pottinger.
While it placed no runners in last year's sectional top 10, Peoria Richwoods utilized a tight pack to earn the crown by five points (123-128) over Belvidere. The momentum of that performance seems to have carried over and last week the Knights ran away from second-place Peoria Notre Dame (32-45) at the Peoria Manuel Regional.

Junior Carol Campbell and sophomore Hallema Ivory led the Knights that day, taking second and third place respectively. PND's Teresa Corsentino topped the field over the 2.1-mile course with a time of 12:57. Campbell ran 13:10 for a sectional second.

Metamora is the fourth regional champion coming to town Saturday. The Redbirds, led by first-place finisher, sophomore Talva Parker (13:00 for 2.05-miles), claimed the Pontiac Regional from Oswego by eight points (39-47).

Other teams which bode watching include Guilford, as its honorable mention in Best Times indicates it should, along with Peoria Notre Dame, United Township, Geneseo, Pon-

tiac and Oswego.

UT and Geneseo were two of the qualifers for last year's state meet, along with this year's three favorites, and the Lady Panthers eventually went on to finish 17th overall. The Lady Leafs' were 20th.

Moline was the top finisher from this sectional, taking 12th. Belvidere was 16th and Richwoods 21st. Lester was the only returning runner to finish in last year's top 25.

Moline tops Sterling Sectional field

STERLING — Even though the field for Saturday's Sterling Class AA Cross Country Sectional should be as competitive as ever, if you happen ask any of the 20 teams looking to fill the five berths for next week's state meet in Peoria who is the best team in the field you'd get an almost unanimous answer - Moline's hard-running Maroons.

The Maroons simply overwhelmed last year's sectional field, outdistancing secondplace Geneseo 38-100, on their way to a third-place finish one week later in Peoria.

And with three starters returning from that squad, led by Rock Island Sectional champ Cesar Lopez, Class AA's No. 4 ranked team, according to the Oct. 15 edition of Illinois Prep Top Times, seems quite capable of making Saturday's race over the three-mile Hoover Park course it's personal showcase once again.

But that isn't an indication of a dearth of running talent beyond the Moline contingent, as up to 10 teams could be in the midst of a battle for the four other team qualifying

spots for next week's state gathering in Detweiller Park.

When mentioning the teams to watch you have to begin with the other three regional

champions and some strong runners-up.

Ranked 13th in the final regular-season poll, Peoria Richwoods was the only other

Sterling Sectional qualifier to earn Top 20 recognition.

However, the Knights found themselves playing second fiddle to Peoria Notre Dame in last week's Peoria Manual Sectional. The Irish handily underpointed Richwoods 38-56 in a meet run on the state meet course.

Pacing them to that championship was senior Joe McEnroe, who clipped the three mile course in 15:17 to take top honors by over 25 seconds. McEnroe is the top returning individual from last year's sectional (he was eighth) and should battle the likes of Lopez and others for the individual crown.

With a championship in last weekend's Rockford Boylan Regional to go with its NIC-9 title, Rockford Guilford also has high hopes of making yet another team excursion to

Peoria.

The Knights, who earned honorable mention in the final regular season poll, ran its regional without No. 1 harrier Pete Dahlin, out with the flu, but was still able to put its top five runners among the race's first 18 finishers and defeat Belvidere by four points.

Champions of their own regional, beating out Metamora by a slim 47-50 margin, Pontiac's Indians hope to climb back into the sectional top five after a year's absence. They have the past credentials to prove they're quite capable as they wore the sectional crown in 1987 and were 1986 state champions in Class A.

Teams which didn't bring home first-place regional trophies but still with legitimate shots of earning state berths are the second and third-place teams from Rock Island always powerful Geneseo and the host Rocks — and Richwoods by virtue of its upset by Notre Dame. Hoping to slip in should the favorites falter include teams from Belvidere, Metamora, Oswego and Rockford East.

Geneseo Coach Don Fredericks called his team's second-place performance behind Moline at regional better than the one it turned in when it earned a 12th-place finish in

last year's state meet.

Rock Island ran second to the Maroons in the Western Big 6 meet and has a fine individual runner in Marlon Hall, who finished second to Lopez at both conference and regional. Lopez had a winning time of 15:26.8 to 15:37.5 for Hall, who has replaced graduated state champion Mario Vesey as the Rocks' No. 1 harrier.

Other individuals who figure to fare well Saturday include Boylan Regional champ and NIC-9 titlist David Johns, who clocked a 15:21 over the 2.95-mile course while winning

by over 20 seconds; and Pontiac winner Joe Weigel of Metamora.

Weigel, a sophomore, defeated Craig Black by five seconds, with a time of 15:48 for the three-mile run. No runners from Saturday's field placed among the top 25 individuals at last year's state meet.

The top seven individuals from Saturday's race not part of a state-qualifying team

also advance to Peoria.

Wassell will fly solo for the Lady Leafs

STERLING - It was both an exciting and disappointing day for Geneseo's girls cross country team at the Class AA Sterling Sectional on Saturday, Oct. 28.

For the first time in six years, the Lady Leafs will not be running at the upcoming state meet as a team but managed to advance at least one runner to the race in Peoria.

Geneseo finished two places short of advancing as a team with 168 points for seventh. Junior Wendy Wassell will be running the course at Detweil ler Park in Peoria on Saturday, Nov. 4 without her Lady Leaf teammates. Wassell took 10th place overall, and was the fourth best individual not on a qualifying team with a time of 12:53 on the 2.1-mile course.

"The girls are very disappointed that

they didn't qualify as a team. They all performed at a high level, and I'm not disappointed with that. The sectionals are very competitive and they get tougher every year," Geneseo coach Don Fredericks said. "Any other year, this team would have advanced but because of the increased competition we won't be sending a team."

As expected, Moline was the dominant factor in Saturday's race at Woodlawn School/Hoover Park. The Maroons finished on top of the team race, edging out Peoria Richwoods 90-114 for the sectional championship.

The meet-favorite Maroons were led by the race winner Trista Lester. Lester and Rock Island's Kris Braet battled it out for the first half of the course until Lester picked up the pace to put her ahead of the pack for the win Wassell kept with the leaders hoping one-and-a-half seconds faster we to set the pace for her fellow Leaf runners.

"It seemed to take-forever going through the woods and the straightaways were long. I had my mind set on staying with Lester and (Chris) Lammer. I knew if I could stay with them I'd be able to finish near the top," Wassell said after her race. "I was a little disappointed with my finish. Last year I finished seventh."

While Wassell was making her way through the chute at the end of the race, Geneseo's Renee Clifton, Suzanne Patton and Kirstin Kemmis all finished within five seconds of each other for 32nd, 34th, and 37th place, respectively. Karmen Roehrs, who has been battling a hip injury, finished 60th and Julie Ghys rounded out the Geneseo racers in 116th place.

"I figured it out if each girl had run

one-and-a-nait seconds faster we would have qualified as a team, It's nothing against the girls because their performances were terrific, it just shows how close and strong the competition was," Fredericks said. "With five all-conference individuals on the team, its disappointing for the kids to end the season on a down note but they all should be pleased with everything they have accomplished."

Patton, who had been running fifth throughout most of the season, came in third, just one second behind Genesco's number two girl, Renee Clifton.

Although the season has ended for the Lady Leafs, except Wassell, the team will continue to practice with the state-bound harrier throughout this week. Wassell, returning to state for her third straight year, will go for the gold at Detweiller Park on Saturday.

being a strong competitor you won't finish well as a team."

No holding back boys in title defense

STERLING — Moline's boys cross country team has been winning all year. They made sure that continued here Saturday in the Sterling Sectional meet, despite some chaotic obstacles.

Starting from a far outside postposition that added about 30 yards to the three-mile Woodlawn School/ Hoover Park layout, the Western Big 6 and regional champion Maroons were forced to after their attook in garnering another title

But showing some resiliency, the Maroons did just that. While Saturday's 78-point winning total was far less impressive than last year's winning 38, it was as effective.

Geneseo, led by Jason Van-Vooren's eighth-place finish, took fourth in the team race with 135 points, behind Peoria Notre Dame (111) and Peoria Richwoods (134). Pontiac, which totaled 145 points, rounded out the top 5 teams that qualified for Saturday's state meet at Peoria's Detweiller Park.

Rock Island lost its natural order of things and ended up in seventh with 180 points. On the bright side for the Rocks was senior Marlon Hall. He finished ninth individually and qualified for the state finals.

United Township's team also competed Saturday and gained the valuable experience Coach Gary. Phillips was hoping for his youngsters. The Panthers were led by Charles Embry's 35th-place effort.

As the boys race became a battle of attrition, the struggling Moline harriers showed their colors. Cesar Lopez, who has run in front of the pack in just about every meet all year, very early Saturday found himself running from behind.

"I got a bad start," said the Western Big 6 and Rock Island Regional champ. "It took me a long-time to get out. I got way behind early."

And in the long run, that cost the junior as he closed in on the leaders before settling for the Quad-Cities' highest finish, a fourth-place effort with a 15:21 clocking. The extended start also hurt Tauwon Taylor—who didn't have his normal halfmiler kick at the end. Still, he joined his teammate, Rocky's Hall and Geneseo's VanVooren in the top 10 with his seventh-place finish.

"It was physically impossible for us to start the race we are trained for," said Moline coach Jeff Quick, still tooking concerned a short time after watching both his boys and girls win sectional championships. "Those kids were forced to run like they've never run this year before—from behind. We have never done that. We are a front-running team."

But that says a lot for the Maroons composure. In addition to Lopez and Taylor, Dave Krauel was 18th (15:50), Carlos Rivera 22nd (15:54) and Brian Spriet (26th) in 15:56.

Leafs qualify again

Getting his boys team qualified almost put a smile on Coach Don Frederick's face, but the disappointment of not getting his girls team to Peoria put a damper on the day.

"We had solid efforts from our top three again," said Fredericks, refer-

STERLING - Sometimes a short surge in a distance race will make the difference in the long run.

That was exactly the case here Saturday in the girls Class AA Sterling Sectional run, but the aggressor with a bold move turned out to be the victim and that went a long way to making the 2.1-mile race a short

Just after the one-mile mark. UT's Chris Lammers sprinted past Moline's Trista Lester and Rock Island's Kris Braet, who were respectively running first and second. But Lammers' lead lasted only a short distance as Lester regained the upper hand on a gentle downhill roll in the 2.1-mile Woodlawn School/ Hoover Park course and never looked back.

With Lester leading the field in a time of 12:16, the Maroons also finished on top in the team race, outdistancing runner-up Peoria Richwoods 90-114 for the sectional championship.

Lammers, after the spurt, had to settle for a fifth-place finish in a time of 12:40, right behind Braet's fourth-place, 12:35 clocking. UT's Amber Turf, Moline's Stephanic Dyer, and Geneseo's Wendy Wassell all turned in top 10 efforts. Turf was seventh (12:46), Dyer was eighth (12:47) and Wassell 10th (12:53).

Lammers got plenty of support from her teammates as the Panthers pulled off a mild surprise in clinching the fifth and final team spot for Saturday's state meet at Peoria's Detweiller Park. Belvidere (122) and Peoria Notre Dame (142) finished third and fourth as UT's 148 points placed them ahead of Rockford Guilford (167) and Geneseo (168). The team qualifying spots were expected to be a toss-up between those seven schools.

But the local contingent made sure that the individual race was all

Quad-Cities out front. Lester and left Coach Jeff Quick pleased. Braet led from the start and held their positions until Lammers made her move.

"It's a spot on the course I like." said Lammers, who said she thought that one explosion might get her past the local foes. But it backfired. "The surge kind of wiped me out."

And left the door open for Lester, who made amends for a big disappointment here last year. In '88 Lester was pushed down and still managed a third-place finish just six seconds off the pace.

The state meet will be held Saturday, November 4 at Detweiler Park in Peoria.




